In honor of Women's History Month

The photo to the right was posted to Facebook on March 20 by The Historian's Den. I'm reposting it here in honor of Women's History Month.

This is one of the many stories depicting the huge part women played in history and settlement – in this case in New France (Quebec, Canada), but also in the early days of the land that would become the United States.

The Historian's Den said:

"In 1663, King Louis XIV of France initiated a program to address the gender imbalance in New France (modern-day Quebec). This program, known as the "Filles du Roi" or "Daughters of the King," involved sending approximately 800 young women to the colony between 1663 and 1673. These women, mostly orphans or from humble backgrounds, were recruited to marry male settlers and help establish families in the sparsely populated colony. The initiative was spearheaded by Jean Talon, the Intendant of New France, with support from Minister Jean-Baptiste Colbert. The women were provided with dowries funded by the king and were transported across the Atlantic to Quebec City, where they were welcomed by settlers



In 1663, France sent 800 women, known as the "Filles du Roi" ("Daughters of the King"), to Quebec to marry settlers. This initiative succeeded, doubling the population within 10 years. Today, two-thirds of French Canadians can trace their ancestry back to these women.

"The Filles du Roi played a crucial role in the development of New France. Upon arrival, they were given the freedom to choose their husbands, a rare privilege for women of that era. Many of these women settled in rural areas, contributing to the growth of farming communities and the overall population of the colony.

"The program was a success, as it significantly boosted the population of New France and laid the foundation for many French-Canadian families today. The legacy of the Filles du Roi is commemorated in places like Dieppe, France, where a plaque honors their departure, and in Quebec, where their contributions to the colony's history are celebrated." 


